The Circe's several lost minutes, particularly after the second mark, were fatal to her finishing well enough ahead to win the race on the time allowance. The Winsome pulled up so that she was a bare boat's length back at the finish line.

Regarding the Angelica, the Stimson-Henry-owned schooner which made a long trip from New York to join the local fleet, one can only say she is still untried. Her maiden yesterday is no indication of what she has in her. Beyond a doubt, she doesn't like soft and balmy breezes.

Gwen Gobs Ashore

As for the matron of the fleet, Gwendolyn II.: Skipper Fritz Hellenenthal and his hard-boiled crew knew they were being licked by Circe and Winsome, but the licking wasn't as bad as it looked to Judge Joy and his gun-bearer.

The truth is that "Gwen" ran ashore when within a 100 feet of the second mark. Skipper Hellenenthal had just gotten to an interesting point in the Scotchman duo story when she piled up on the colar reef. The headsailmen must have been dozing.

Thirty-five minutes were spent on the reef. True to the spirit of the game, the Gwendolyn refused many proffers of aid in salvage-drag.

In the powerboat race, seventeen started at 2:30 with orders to get back promptly at 4:30 from the five-mile chug.

Camid, Skipper M. M. Chisholm, was but three seconds off and won. Who Cares, Skipper "Doc" Harvey, was second, twenty seconds off; Tony Boy, Skipper Bob Moore, was third at fifty-five seconds off, and Virginia Dare, skippered by Lewis A. Dare, took fourth place, seventy-five seconds away from perfect timing.

Class S--Iris alone finished.

Flatties--Akbar won, followed by Barracuda, La Gavita, Clypso, Madam Jacquart and Vandra.
